Your editorial ("Our CBD deserves the love", Nov 30) was spot on.

Right now, living in the concrete canyons of the city is a totally unattractive proposition. This is not just because of a shortage of apartments in or near the city. It's essentially the result of bad government planning. with political vanity projects like the convention centre, the Bell Tower (pictured) and Elizabeth Quay being constructed at the expense of public amenity. I don't know about you, but I've never heard anyone say "let's visit Elizabeth Quay" (cost in excess of \$2 billion), or the highly subsidised Bell Tower (\$7 million). In particular, the Elizabeth Quay project (aka Betty's Jetty) was in reality a massive opportunity lost. I urge planners to look at South Bank in Brisbane
— landscaped parks, walking trails, a museum, a State library and art gallery, picnic areas, a huge man-made swimming pool and artificial beach, plus restaurants and cafes. Perth's Esplanade and Langley Park, from Mounts Bay Road to

the Causeway, was

the ideal location for a similar, forward-thinking project. Yes, I'm aware that there was a World Expo in Brisbane in 1988, which stimulated the development of South Bank. So, what does the Cook Labor Government do? Propose a car racetrack and Perth Park, 5km from the Perth CBD. This will be known as Cook's cock-up.
