Dr Snow was deeply committed to public health and responded swiftly to prevent further suffering.

I have nursed patients on ventilators in ICU suffering legionnaires' disease and I can not comprehend not doggedly pursuing any epidemiological clues as to a source of this preventable disease.

It is not acceptable that an investigation of identifying a source of legionnaires' disease at Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital, was rejected (*News*, 4/10)


Was it one budget item too many for a hospital under tight constraint?
