That makes it 16 times there has been an excessive amount of lead recorded at PCH since January 2023. The Government's response? Not to come clean but to resume its deflect, deny and dismiss approach. Remember, they didn't offer up this information,

the public had to read about it. But still there is no protocol in place to inform the public if it

place to inform the public if it happens again.

Let me remind everyone what we are talking about here. Not noise from V8 engines, but toxic metal in the water at our children's hospital. In the words of the National Health and Medical Research Council, lead consumption can severely affect the central nervous system with young children and babies the most susceptible.

And still the Government don't think patients, their parents or staff have a right to know when levels get beyond the recommended safety benchmark.
